Greetings from NPRA's President

San Antonio, Texas March 30, 2008

Welcome to NPRA's 33rd International Petrochemical Conference! The IPC is the petrochemical industry's premier conference, and is the largest, most successful and productive international meeting of its kind with participants from roughly 600 companies located in more than 40 countries.

Our industry faced a number of challenges in 2006, and 2007 was no different. The United States Congress began to consider climate change legislation that could dramatically impact the feedstock supplies and cost to operate in the U.S. Natural gas prices remained high, and little is being done on Capitol Hill to open up domestic exploration to increase supply levels.

2008 will present its own challenges and opportunities, many of which will be discussed here in San Antonio over the course of the next two days. We are facing one of the most politically uncertain years that we have experienced in a long time. Climate change, chemical risk management and security policies will undoubtedly affect our future business practices, and what those policies will look like will in large part depend on the outcome of the November elections. But these are not just domestic issues that we are facing.

Under the United Nations Environment Programme, the Strategic Approach to International Chemicals Management has moved the discussion of chemicals policy to the international stage. While NPRA members are working to meet the requirements of REACH, the Toxic Substances Control Act, and other regional regulatory schemes, environmental activists are coordinating their efforts in an attempt to bring their own version of the Precautionary Principle, a thinly disguised synonym for product substitution, to the global arena. From chemical

risk policy to facility security, NPRA remains engaged with policymakers and other industry groups to build a strong, united voice for tiered, targeted, and risk-based approaches to chemical risk management.

On rail issues, NPRA will continue to advocate for rail competition and participate in broad industry coalitions to help educate lawmakers on the importance of efficient and affordable rail service. NPRA will specifically call for an end to anticompetitive practices long enjoyed by the railroads.

This year's IPC features a number of prominent speakers that will address the challenges our industry faces, and how politics and world events will impact our businesses in the not-too-distant future. We are pleased to have Sherman Glass, Jr., Senior Vice President for ExxonMobil Chemical Company, and Graeme Sweeney, Executive Vice President, Future Fuels and CO₂, for Shell deliver our keynote addresses Monday morning. Well-known political pollsters Peter Hart and Frank Luntz will debate the 2008 U.S. Presidential election during the Petrochemical Forum, and former Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich will headline the International Petrochemical Luncheon on Tuesday.

NPRA will continue to play a critical role in shaping the nation's petrochemical future, and will work closely with our members and policymakers to ensure that a reliable supply of fuels and chemicals is available to the American consumer. As always, we appreciate your active, enthusiastic participation in the annual IPC and with NPRA throughout the year. We hope you enjoy the program!

NPRA Antitrust Policy

The National Petrochemical & Refiners Association is a non-profit, tax-exempt membership association organized to foster cooperation and the exchange of technical information among its members. These worthwhile activities are sanctioned by custom and law. It is important, however, to recognize that these activities are subject to the legal limits of federal and state antitrust laws. NPRA is committed to complying with the antitrust laws in all respects and has adopted the following guidelines in order to facilitate compliance with the antitrust laws at its meetings:

As a general matter, the antitrust laws prohibit competitors from agreeing on the prices they will charge, the products they will offer, the customers they will serve, or the markets in which they will compete. Therefore, there should be no discussion or disclosure of information with respect to (a) expected profits, premiums, prices, surcharges, or discounts; (b) specific customers or classes of customers, or whether you will or will not do business with them; (c) proposed product offerings; (d) allocation of geographic or product markets; (e) any refusal to deal with a customer or supplier; (f) how to deal with the market behavior of a competitor; or (g) any other topic involving a potentially anticompetitive practice.

Some subjects of discussion may lead to agreements that are not unlawful on their face but that may have an unlawful anticompetitive effect or may give rise to the inference of an anticompetitive act, depending upon their scope and how they are implemented. Other subjects may appear to be prohibited by the antitrust laws but in fact may be permitted because of the context or ultimate purpose of the communication. Whether discussing a subject is permissible may vary depending on factors such as the nature of the subject matter, its relationship to competition among NPRA members, the purpose of the communication, and the degree of restraint that NPRA members can be expected to exercise.

We cannot make a statement that will take the place of advice from your own company or that will cover every situation. We do suggest that those attending our meetings may avoid difficulties for themselves and for the Association by observing these principles and calling to NPRA's attention any violations you may observe at any of our meetings.
