

Reliability & Maintenance Conference and Exhibition: Managing the Course of Change


Welcome to the 2008 NPRA Reliability & Maintenance Conference and Exhibition in San Antonio, TX. All events will be held at the Henry B. Gonzalez Convention Center.

Reliability, mechanical integrity, and operating safely continue to grow in importance to our industries as competitive pressures increase. Managing the course of change and successfully adapting to the business environment will depend on our resourcefulness and commitment to implementing new technologies, more efficient work practices, and a more deeply ingrained safety culture. The NPRA Reliability & Maintenance Conference enables you to anticipate change, identify the tools you will need, and initiate the steps that will lead to improved reliability and safer operation.

The program emphasizes sharing knowledge and benefiting from the experience of others so that you can improve performance. The program has expanded to 35 workshops in seven topic tracks: Analyzers, Electrical, & Instrumentation (AEI); Maintenance Execution; Principles & Practices; Process Safety Management; Procurement; Reliability; and Turnarounds. The topic tracks that are new in 2008 - AEI and Process Safety Management - allow the conference program to adapt to changes in the industry. The former recognizes the expanding role of automation in our facilities while the latter is explicit recognition that process safety is an essential component of all of our activities. The workshops will be interactive and attendees will be encouraged to ask questions and share their own experiences and challenges. The Q&A sessions are formatted to maximize interaction and will offer attendees the opportunity to have their specific questions answered.

Workshop Sessions

Many of the workshop sessions will have a single presentation followed by a group discussion on the topic while others include an informal panel. The workshops provide opportunities for smaller groups to have detailed discussions on topics of special interest to reliability, maintenance and operations personnel. You are encouraged to come to the workshops prepared to discuss your company's experiences or concerns on the subject. Q&A Sessions

The program includes three Q&A sessions where panelists will lead a discussion of today's critical issues. The Analyzers, Electrical and Instrumentation (AEI) Q&A session will focus on the pros and cons of new technologies, evaluating their potential, and implementation issues. The Reliability Q&A will focus on the tools and proven practices used to improve reliability and the Turnaround Q&A will focus on the challenges of turnaround planning and execution. The questions for the Q&A Sessions are taken from actual questions and problems that have been submitted by your peers. Panelists bring carefully prepared answers to the sessions and then use their experience and knowledge to respond to questions raised by session attendees

Professional Development

The conference will be preceded by a one-day program offering five professional development courses. Full-day seminars will be offered on Managing Safety Performance™ by Balmert Consulting; Leadership by Coaching in Action; API 753 by Baker Engineering and Risk Consultants; and Mechanical Integrity by ABS Consulting. There will also be a half-day seminar on Work Process Management by RMG. There is an additional registration fee for these seminars.

Each participant is expected to display courtesy to all fellow attendees and maintain the highest level of professional decorum and speech at all times. Unacceptable behavior will not be tolerated and violators will be asked to leave.

NPRA Anti-Trust Policy

The National Petrochemical & Refiners Association is a nonprofit, tax-exempt membership association organized to foster cooperation and the exchange of technical information among its members. These worthwhile activities are sanctioned by custom and law. It is important, however, to recognize that these activities are subject to the legal limits of federal and state antitrust laws. NPRA is committed to complying with the antitrust laws in all respects and has adopted the following guidelines in order to facilitate compliance with the antitrust laws at its meetings:

As a general matter, the antitrust laws prohibit competitors from agreeing on the prices they will charge, the products they will offer, the customers they will serve, or the markets in which they will compete. Therefore, there should be no discussion or disclosure of information with respect to (a) expected profits. premiums, prices, surcharges, or discounts; (b) specific customers or classes of customers, or whether you will or will not do business with them: (c) proposed product offerings; (d) allocation of geographic or product markets; (e) any refusal to deal with a customer or supplier; (f) how to deal with the market behavior of a competitor; or (g) any other topic involving a potentially anticompetitive practice.

Some subjects of discussion may lead to agreements that are not unlawful on their face but that may have an unlawful anticompetitive effect or may give rise to the inference of an anticompetitive act, depending upon their scope and how they are implemented. Other subjects may appear to be prohibited by the antitrust laws but in fact may be permitted because of the context or ultimate purpose of the communication. Whether discussing a subject is permissible may vary depending on factors such as the nature of the subject matter, its relationship to competition among NPRA members, the purpose of the communication, and the degree of restraint that NPRA members can be expected to exercise.

We cannot make a statement that will take the place of advice from your own company or that will cover every situation. We do suggest that those attending our meetings may avoid difficulties for themselves and for the Association by observing these principles and calling to NPRA's attention any violations you may observe at any of our meetings.

Future Conference Schedule

Entertainment Policy

We ask your cooperation in observing Association Policy on activities held in conjunction with any NPRA meeting:

- Meetings or social activities should not be scheduled that take registrants away from NPRA programs and NPRA-sponsored activities;
- Companies are asked to restrict entertainment outside hospitality suites to activities that do not include expensive or elaborate entertainment;

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

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


