# **2009 Environmental Conference: Advance Program**

With the new Obama Administration we have already seen major changes in environmental policy and enforcement and this year's program is shaping up to be one not to be missed. We have invited Nancy Sutley, Council of Environmental Quality Chair to present our keynote address. This session will be followed by presentations on climate, flares, water issues and a panel and papers on National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS). On Tuesday, the sessions will focus on Optical Remote Sensing and presentations on monitoring cooling towers and planning for the termination of refinery consent decrees. Each presentation will be followed by time for questions from the audience where you can share your experiences or ask other industry experts for help with your specific needs. As always the meeting will end with a panel discussion and newsreel on current regulatory and legislative updates.

The NPRA Environmental Conference focuses on regulatory and policy issues at the plant level. The meeting format consists of both technical presentations and question and answer sessions. The sessions are designed to address the impacts of various environmental regulations on refineries and petrochemical plants and to provide solutions and compliance mechanisms for a facility. A poster session highlights technologies and systems developed or used by organizations to improve environmental compliance and controls. The Conference features industry experts from refining and petrochemical companies.

#### **Panel Discussions**

Questions for the panel discussions represent real questions and problems that have been submitted by your peers. Panelists include representatives from the NPRA Environmental Committee, operating companies, service organizations and government agencies. Panelists bring prepared answers to the sessions and use their experience and knowledge to respond to questions raised by attendees.

# NPRA Workshop: Greenhouse Gases – What Does The Future Hold? A Look at The Emerging Federal Requirements and Industry Prospects for Reducing and Controlling Greenhouse Gas Emissions

Cap-and-trade or carbon tax? While the exact nature of greenhouse gas regulations in the U.S. is still murky, it is clear that carbon will be regulated at some level. The purpose of this workshop is, primarily, to discuss the various options available to US industry (specifically the petroleum refining and petrochemicals industry) to reduce their effective carbon emissions. Some options are "soft", i.e., where no controls are necessary. Other solutions will involve add-on systems to capture and control the release of carbon emissions. Still other solutions will involve reduction of energy intensity-the amount of energy used to manufacture a given unit of production.

- Strict compliance with federal antitrust laws.
- Adherence to all applicable federal and state laws.
- Maintenance of the highest level of professional and personal ethical behavior while attending NPRA meetings and forums.
- Prevention of certain behaviors, including harassment, violence, intimidation and discrimination of any kind involving race, color, religion, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, age, disability or, where applicable, veteran or marital status.
- Assurance that conduct at all times and in all professional and personal dealings with each other and other attendees with the highest level of integrity and courtesy.
- Sharing of knowledge and expertise as speakers at NPRA educational events and sessions whenever practicable, without soliciting or explicitly promoting their own organization's products or services.
- Working to instill public and consumer confidence in the petrochemical and refining industries, its member companies, and its professionals, avoiding any action conducive to discrediting members of NPRA.
- Refraining from scheduling general attendance meetings, receptions or other events at times that conflict with substantive programming or social events at NPRA meetings without express written permission of NPRA.

Failure to abide by the Code may result, for the first offense, in informal censure of a company or individual by the NPRA Executive Committee. If violations of the Code continue after such an informal censure, a company may be subject to expulsion from NPRA, or an individual to exclusion from participation in NPRA activities, by the Board of Directors.
